REPORT OF THE MAYOR

Acting Mayor Keogh started by sharing that he attended the December 7th Tree Commission graduates ceremony. Asked Public Works Director Pilcher to give our thanks to those Whitehouse employees who attended to learn more for our community.

Acting Mayor Keogh also shared that he was part of the team of judges for the recent Holiday Decorating Contest, several awards were given out to residents and businesses.

REPORT OF THE CLERK OF COUNCIL

Acting Mayor Keogh asked for any items to report from Clerk Nicole Hartbarger. There were none.

REPORT OF THE VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR

Acting Mayor Keogh asked for any items to report from Administrator Jordan Daugherty.

Before a motion was made, there was some discussion and questions:

Councilwoman Curry asked Solicitor Heban why this is being requested as an emergency and not the standard three voting periods. Solicitor Heban shared that this state law became effective recently on December 7th, it is changing daily in Columbus at the state level. He stated that passing as an emergency helps stop changes from slipping through at the Village level during the stretched out voting time.

Councilwoman Conklin Kleiboemer asked if this decision at the Village level would stand no matter what is decided at the state level. Solicitor Heban shared that he is still unsure at this time, most municipalities are doing this stop gap, safe guard measure to get control of the situation as it is now.

Councilman Keogh asked can we change. Solicitor Heban commented, yes we can always go back if needed; could do some zoning regulations, etc. in addition. He also stated that from a police perspective, the state attorney general advised just today that 'this may change tomorrow'.

Councilwoman Curry asked for confirmation that this motion is just for retailers. Solicitor Heban shared that it includes cultivation/growers, but does not affect personal growth on own property; that decision may take a year for recreational. He said we have already prohibited a medical marijuana growth (large scale).

REPORT OF THE VILLAGE SOLICITOR

Acting Mayor Keogh asked Solicitor Kevin Heban for any items to be reported. There were none.

CITIZEN COMMENTS ON AGENDA ITEMS

Acting Mayor Keogh asked for Citizen Comments pertaining to Agenda items.

Mark Easterwood - 6163 Forest Edge: Mr. Easterwood shared that he came to the meeting tonight to share his thoughts and experience with medicinal marijuana. He stated that the cultivation of marijuana near and dear to him in recent years. He has lived with severe Crohn's Disease for 25 years, and now includes severe arthritis throughout his body. Easterwood shared some of his history: 2012 back surgery was required, some complications; 2019 knee surgery with complications, 7+ surgeries after; PET scan for cancer check; over 48 meds a day – does not like taking opioids as they change his personality. He has chosen to use medical marijuana and it has given him a new hope on life and improved symptoms. He shared that the medical marijuana is about quality of life; he is asking Council to please remember those who are benefitting from the medical marijuana.

Councilman Keogh shared that we are glad Mr. Easterwood is still with us, and a thank you for sharing his story and educating Council. Easterwood commented that they have had to do a lot of research and get questions answered and he would be willing to help continue to educate Council and those who need it.

Councilwoman Curry commented that the Village legislation cannot touch personal resident's growth and use.

OTHER ITEMS DISCUSSED

Department Heads

Public Services Director Steve Pilcher shared his congrats to the Police and Fire Departments for their very successful toy drive, he stated that the real winners are the kids who benefit from this challenge. He went on to comment that the Public Services department is finishing up year end projects, waterlines are completed. He stated they are mostly done collecting leaves but will complete a few more routes to pick up any last piles that were put out. Next they will be working on planting winter trees. He wished all in attendance a Merry Christmas.

Police Chief Allan Baer shared his congrats to the Fire Department for winning the Toy Drive challenge; almost 3,000 toys brought in by both departments together. He stated that the police department is wrapping up some year end things, their annual report should be ready for the second meeting in February.

Council Comments

Councilman Connelly shared his thanks to Councilwoman Conklin Kleiboemer, Acting Mayor Keogh, and Councilwoman Curry for their friendship, advice, and guidance.

Councilwoman Curry shared that it has been her pleasure to be an elected official since November 2015, and ending her 8th year of service. She stated that she has had a lot of eye-opening experiences, learning government and procedures, etc. She shared that she is glad the statue is still in Whitehouse Park, only historical piece, will now never be removed from its location, and they all had a hand in that. Curry commented that it was great being able to get the park updated, able to make several things in the Village ADA compliant, including the swing in the park. She finished with a comment that it was great serving with all employees of the village, and she will miss them dearly.

Councilwoman Curry took a moment to present to Councilwoman Conklin Kleiboemer a certificate of perfect attendance for all 8 years of her Council service – Councilwoman Conklin Kleiboemer has never missed a meeting. Councilwoman Curry commented that this is a huge accomplishment. Curry lastly wished Merry Christmas and Happy New Year to all.

At this time Councilman Bingham made a motion to utilize same procedure for open council seat, put out notification immediately with a submission deadline on January 4th, make decision by the following council meeting, seconded by Councilman Keogh. 5 ayes

Councilman Bingham asked Councilman Keogh, Councilwoman Conklin Kleiboemer, Councilwoman Curry to come to the podium. Councilman Bingham shared that it has been an honor to serve with these three over the last 6 years – they are passionate in their beliefs and mostly about Whitehouse – they have changed Whitehouse for the better. Some of these changes over the years included: Veterans Memorial, turn signal at Finzel and Weckerly, the FTUCD, Fire Co-Op, downtown streetscaping, exercise equipment, new playground equipment, school support, local library support, Whitehouse Social park, shelter house updates, DeweSoft expansion, new distillery coming to create more jobs.

Councilman Bingham shared comments directly to Councilman Keogh; he remembers six and a half years ago running for council for first time, there was a heated meeting talking about privatizing trash collection, Councilman Keogh stopped Bingham to ask ‘are you sure you want to get involved’ giving a warning/question. Bingham says this stuck with him for last six years, Keogh was always willing to approach and talk about the process from the beginning.

Councilman Bingham shared comments directly to Councilwoman Curry; he stated she is the nicest person to debate with when there is difference of opinions, have disagreed but always professional, that will be missed.

Councilman Bingham shared comments directly to Councilwoman Conklin Kleiboemer; he said there have been some heated debates in chambers, in person, on the phone over the years but his takeaway from that is the passion in Conklin Kleiboemer’s beliefs and to want

to do the right thing – Bingham shared that she has done that, the right thing, and that will be missed.

Councilman Bingham presented certificates of appreciation to Councilman Keogh, Councilwoman Conklin Kleiboemer, Councilwoman Curry for their dedication and years of service to the Village of Whitehouse.

Councilwoman Conklin Kleiboemer shared her thanks. She states that she offers gratitude to the residents of Whitehouse, along with fellow council members. She shared a thank you to previous council members as well. Conklin Kleiboemer shared thanks to Clerks, department heads and staff. She shared a story from years ago, during a meeting a resident yelling at Council to 'do the right thing'. She said her thoughts were 'I'm about to' – Conklin Kleiboemer said when we are here, we are doing the right thing, even when those things are hard. She finished up her comments that from perspective, things have really worked out over the years.

Councilman Keogh commented that being on Council has been a challenging and rewarding experience. He said he has been a resident for over 40 years and always proud to be here. He shared his thanks to everyone.

CITIZEN COMMENTS

Acting Mayor Keogh asked if there were any Citizen comments to be heard. There were none from citizens.

Acting Mayor Keogh shared a quick comment to the newly elected Council Members – a welcome and a thank you to being at the last several meetings, being involved.

1. **Pedestrian Bridge** – A TMACOG funded tap project to install a 10' wide path along the north side of SR 64 between Whitehouse Square Blvd. and Finzel Rd. project includes a 14' wide pedestrian bridge over Blue Creek. – Construction year 2023. 80/20 Grant. Engineers Estimate \$652,000. Grant \$521,600. Conducted ODOT Field Review on 4-27-21. Design Engineering Completed. Legislation for ODOT Bridge Inspection. Project out to bid. Bid over Engineers estimate – bids rejected. Will rebid. Out to bid. Bid opening date – 4/20/23. Bid Over Engineer's Estimate. Will need rebid. Out to bid - bid opening date 9/21/23. Bid awarded to Geddis Paving & Excavating in the amount of \$845,000.00
2. **Whitehouse Streets Resurfacing** – This OPWC funded project will see the resurfacing of Wabash St., Lucas St. Gilead St. and all Blue Creek Gardens resurfaced utilizing traditional mill/fill resurfacing methods. This project is a joint funding project with the Lucas County Engineer which will see a large portion of Dutch Road resurfaced. These projects are being schedule for 2023. Request authorization for Administrator to advertise for bids. Bid Opening – June 15, 2023. Awarded to Henry W. Bergman, Inc. - \$163,442.87. Project to start the week of October 9, 2023.
3. **Swanton Street Reconstruction** – Total Reconstruction of Swanton Street, from Maumee to Texas St. This is in the OPWC project pipeline for FY 2024.
4. **North Texas St. (Lone Oak Ditch to Swan Creek), Bond St., Cemetery Rd (Intersection at SR 64)** – 2025 OPWC Street Resurfacing

Wrapping up plans to submit to OEPA. Easement acquisitions underway. Awarded to Mark Shaffer’s Excavating & Trucking for \$2,486,185.00. Construction Spring 2021-Project started March 2021. Presently on hold-delay in material acquisition. Material acquired-construction has resumed. Cemetery Rd closing July 26th for 35 days. Cemetery Rd. & Wabash Cannonball Trail are open. Currently constructing final connections at Logan and Field Ave. All underground construction completed. Earth work & pavement restoration is underway. Final clean up completed. Awaiting project closeout.

1. Staff working with Lucas County Engineer to move forward petition process for the maintenance of Swan Creek to include all of the Swan Creek Watershed west of I-475 in Lucas County. Petitions to be filed with Lucas County. Ditch petition hearing to begin Spring 2021. Petition Filed. First reading held 12-2-21. Approved by unanimous vote to continue with determining the need for ditch maintenance and costs. Expected to take 24 months to gather information.
